



# MAP-Ed Quarterly Update: October 14. 2017





Various abandoned property picked up by MPD

At our quarterly meeting on October 14, we had quite a few great guests! Sergent Daniel Verna, from Community Policing, gave us a great update on abandoned personal property. This aspect of homelessness is one that many people find problematic due to trash, drug paraphernalia and other personal property being found in public spaces. While some call for the Police to just take people's items, homeless people, like anyone else, have rights. The Police Department went over different laws they are mindful of and how they can properly remove someone's property– after 72 hours. Read more about how this works and how Monrovia PD is working with the homeless population from the link

Next, we had Kristi Lopez from Senator Portantino's office to update us about laws coming this month. New laws include; an increase of funding for education for both K-12 and higher education; workplace protections; laws to benefit women and children; public safety; monies for parks and open space throughout the state; and an increase of taxes for deferred maintenance on highways and local streets. In addition, quite a few laws have been passed to address various issues with the housing supply and affordability. Due to time constraints, Kristi was unable to go into detail on everything, but don't worry, we have more information for you at the link below!

Lastly, City Manager Oliver Chi discussed the City's water supply issues and what that means for residents and business owners. There are over 9,500 water users (homes/businesses/apartment complexes etc) in the City of Monrovia and while, over the past few years, we, as a whole, have used less (28% less!) water ...Southern California is still in a serious drought. Specifically, the Los



Angeles County water basins are in dire need to refill the aquifers where our groundwater lies. Due to this and the damage that our ever dwindling aquifer could incur, the Watermaster is establishing new rates for cities to be able to purchase water. # Community Development Block Grant

January 2018 Page 5

As you know by now, MAP has amazing programs that are all about YOU. How can we, as City staff, best help our residents be successful and get the most out of their community? One of our many ways includes the Community Development Block Grant.

The intent of the City of Monrovia Residential Rehabilitation Home Improvement Grant is to provide grants to eligible homeowners / occupants of single family detached homes for the preservation of decent, safe and sanitary housing; to correct hazardous conditions; to make improvements to eliminate blight and improve handicapped access; and to correct building and health code violations through the awarding of Community Development Block Grants (CDBG). All properties to be repaired must be a single family residential located in the a low-moderate income census tract and be within the City limits of Monrovia. Up next? Repairs on 3 more houses will be finished this month. Stay tuned for updates on new roofs, great railing and fixing pesky doors. In the mean time, check out last year's work!

This home was in desperate need on a new roof and replacement of much of the fascia boards. Look how great those fascia boards look! In Fiscal Year 2016-2017, our Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Residential Rehabilitation Program assisted three homeowners in successfully rehabilitating their homes by eliminating blight, improving handicapped access and correcting building and health code violations. Each year, the City gets approximately \$45,000 to use towards our CDBG Residential Rehabilitation grants, which provide various repairs for qualified homeowners. We use those funds to pay for 1) construction costs, 2) the use of a consultant and 3) staff time.

(1321) This homeowner was a widow in need of assistance to keep up with general maintenance with her home. We were able to assist this grandmother in getting new upgraded electrical outlets in the kitchen and bathrooms, new smoke and Carbon Monoxide detectors, and new paint on the house and trim to replace the peeling and faded paint. Her bright and sunny home is now brightening up her corner of the neighborhood!





(1309) When we met this homeowner, she was initially seeking a handrail to help her up and down her stairs on her entryway. After talking, she told us how her home desperately needed to be painted as well. In addition to painting and the handrail, we added upgraded electrical outlets in the kitchen and smoke and Carbon Monoxide detectors throughout the

(535) This grandmother takes care of her three grandchildren, while working part time and needed a little bit of help. Even though met during the spring, she mentioned to us she was in need of two new furnaces and had a leak in the roof. Because of health and safety issues, we jumped right into action to replace those items as well as including new upgraded electrical outlets in the kitchen and bathrooms, as well as smoke and Carbon Monoxide detectors.

#### Code Enforcement Tip

Yard sales are very popular here in Monrovia. Here are a few reminders so that your yard sale will be a happy and hopefully, profitable experience. A \$5.00 yard sale permit must be obtained prior to the date of the sale. These can be purchased at Monrovia City Hall at which time your sale date(s) and location will be updated on our Neighborhood Fix Blog. One yard sale may be held every 6 months (no more than 2 consecutive days). Lastly, signs advertising your yard sale are not permitted on public property (for example; light and electrical poles, sidewalks or the like). Property owners of signs confiscated from public property could be subject to a citation. To avoid this just pay us a visit at Monrovia City Hall and we will take care of you!

The City of Monrovia is pleased to offer the Home Security Rebate Program to all Monrovia residents. Through this pilot program, the City will offer rebates, of up to \$250 per residence, for the purchase of the home security product of their choice.

#### PROGRAM ELIGIBILITY

All applicants must live in the City and be a new subscriber of a security service or have purchased a new security product.

#### **HOW IT WORKS**

- 1. Complete an application at visiting www.cityofmonrovia.org/residentresources.
- 2. Submit a copy of the receipt or invoice.
- 3. Await City review of your application.
- 4. Once your application is approved, you will receive your rebate.

Applications must be received within 60 days of the purchase date.

Limit 1 rebate per residence.

The program will be offered on a first-come, first-serve basis, so we encourage you to apply as soon as possible!

A new component to MAP's Block parties is the unveiling of the Neighborhood Treasures Program. Neighborhood Treasures is an innovative approach to showcase Monrovia's unsung heroes through art and education. Local artists will create art work that honors the chosen "treasures" and the adjacent interpretative signage will share the outstanding accomplishments of these fine Monrovians.

Our first treasure to be celebrated is Colonel Allen Allensworth! For a sneak peek at his life and why he is so special, see below!



Colonel Allen Allensworth April 1842 – September 1914

Colonel Allensworth was born into slavery in Kentucky and was only able to escape during the Civil War, when he became a Union solider. During his career in the army, he became a Chaplain and became the first Black man to reach the rank of lieutenant Colonel. After retirement, he and his family moved to Los Angeles, where he started his work in ministry. In 1902, he was the first preacher at Second Baptist Church here in Monrovia and by 1908, started the township of Allensworth, CA. Allensworth is the only town in the state of California to be founded, financed and governed by African Americans, which was turned into a state park in 1976... *Find out more at his celebration*!!
