## A MESSAGE FROM YOUR CITY MANAGER!

Spring 2020 is a season to remember! Since March 16th, our lives have been consumed by COVID-19 updates, Safer at Home Health Orders and learning the difference between isolation and quarantine! For purposes of the Safer at Home Health Order, we distinguish between Essential Business and a Non-Essential Business. But do we really think that some businesses are any more/less important than others? From my vantage point, our beautiful Monrovia thrives when all of our businesses are open and supporting our local economy. In many ways, I think we will begin measuring our lives in "pre-COVID" and "post-COVID" frames of mind –

- If I feel ill, I will stay home from work. And if a coworker tells me he/she is ill, I am happy to speak up and send the person home.
- My first paycheck came when I worked at a grocery store. Never have I had a deeper appreciation for grocery store employees. In addition, I long for the days where I can meander the aisles without worry of crowd control.
- When parks, trails and playgrounds are closed, we lose the physical, social and mental health amenities we have grown to cherish.

  And I hope I'll never again have to order removal of basketball rims at public parks, nor restrict access to trails and public grounds.
- Old Town Monrovia is a special, unique place with beautiful aesthetics. But I learned that uniqueness comes from the business owners who contribute to our community, not the buildings themselves. When our businesses are closed, we lose the charm and intrigue that makes Monrovia so unique.

Looking forward, every Monrovian will play a role in "normalizing" our community after this pandemic. Businesses will be allowed to reopen. Schools will resume and kids will return to learning. Residents will be invited to support businesses, attend special events, and gather for celebrations. The trails will open and so will Canyon Park.

I have so much hope in my heart and confidence in my mind that "this too will pass." I am forever an eternal optimist and will look forward to the good things. For example –

- The 6th and final phase of Monrovia Renewal Northeast Section will begin in early May. The ambitious \$54m project is near completion...our community has turned our subpar roads, sidewalks and underground utilities into the best among the State.
- We have learned new ways to do things. For Monrovia Days 2020, we had a virtual birthday bash where Monrovians were asked to submit a 20-second video to help create a commemorative video with birthday wishes from our entire community. - The most important story of all ...Los Angeles County residents have performed and are continuing to perform by adhering to Safer at Home guidelines. Sure, we all saw people out-and-about without a mask. Or some non-essential businesses remained open. And who didn't see large groups of people playing at the parks? But the real story is that when California was the FIRST in the nation to issue a statewide Safer at Home Order, Angelenos were already remaining Safer at Home and we've been more sedentary since March than most other communities in this country. We helped "bend/flatten the curve." We haven't crossed the finish line but don't ever let anyone discount the fruits of our labors.

Every morning I begin work, I pray for the wellness of our community. You're in the hearts, minds and prayers of this City's leadership every day. The Mayor, Mayor Pro Tem and City Council, as well as City staff.

## COVID-19 RESPONSE



#### **City Council**

The Monrovia City Council understands the significant impact that this pandemic has on our community. During this time, the Council remains dedicated to the well-being of the community by holding emergency meetings, removing barriers that may not allow for essential services to be provided, and researching policies to ensure that our community will not only recover from this situation, but emerge as an even stronger city.

On Tuesday, March 17, the Monrovia City Council approved titled "Proclamation of Existence of Local Emergenc. The Resolution was forwarded to the Governor's Office of Emergency Services. The continued existence of a local state of emergency enables the City to seek reimbursement for expenditures made responding to the emergency. For the first time ever, Council also met via teleconference pursuant to the Governor's Executive Order N-25-20 whereby City Council members may participate in public meetings via teleconference.

The City Council has approved several measures which are intended to positively impact the community during this difficult time, including:

- Suspending discontinuation or shut-off of water service for residents and businesses in the City for non-payment of water bills
- Suspending the imposition of late payment penalties or fees for delinquent water and/or sewer bills
- Suspending parking enforcement activities except for illegal parking considered a hazard or danger to the public or illegally parked RV's
- Suspending the imposition of late payment penalties or fees for parking violations in the City.
- Business License payment defferal
- Residential and Commercial Eviction Moratorium

The City Council has also provided direction to protect the health and safety of City employees including firefighters, paramedics, police officers, public works crews and other City employees to ensure continuity of essential public services.

These measures take effect immediately and will continue throughout the duration of the Local Emergency unless modified. Council is regularly considering policy matters during this emergency and will meet to discuss at their next meeting or more frequently as needed.

#### City Manager's Office

The <u>City Manager's Office</u> is responsible for preparing public notices, press releases and communicating on behalf of the City. At this time, the City Manager's Office is preparing to provide daily updates related to COVID-19 so Monrovians know where to get latest information.

In addition, the City Manager is designated as the City's Emergency Services Director. This means that in the event a Disaster Proclamation is necessary, the manager would request the City Council to make such a proclamation if Council is in session, or may issue the proclamation when out of session, provided Council formally adopts within seven (7) days. A Disaster Proclamation recognizes the existence of a local emergency and assists the City to mobilize resources and provide emergency response.

Personnel policies and procedures, as well as general updates to employees, are also provided by the City Manager's Office. Communicating effective training, hygiene and updates are important for our first responders, public works crews and hundreds of city employees to pursue a safe working environment.

# CAP TIPS



While we haven't had any reports of these types of scams striking the City of Monrovia residents yet, these are some simple tips you can use to avoid falling victim to a scam or hoax.

-Ignore fraudulent online offers for vaccinations and home test kits related to COVID-19.

-Decline door-to-door solicitations claiming COVID-19 fundraising.

-Beware of fraudulent fundraising campaigns/donation requests for cash, gift cards/credit cards.

-Know who you're buying from, especially online.

-Don't respond to texts and emails about checks from the government.

-Don't click on links from sources you don't know.

-Watch for emails claiming to be from the Centers for Disease Control and prevention (CDC).
-Fact check all information and only use verified sources and authorities. For updated information visit the website first-hand at www.cdc.gov

## RESIDENTIAL RENTERS | COVID-19

City of Monrovia

## INFORMATION & RESOURCES

On Tuesday, March 31st, the City Council approved an Urgency Ordinance which adopted emergency regulations that prohibit residential evictions for non-payment of rent and "no-fault" evictions. The ordinance took effect immediately and will remain in place through the duration of COVID-19 emergency declaration.

- During the existence of the local emergency, no residential property owner or agent shall take any action, or threaten, to evict a tenant in either of the following situations -
  - Nonpayment of rent, late fees, or other fees or charges, if the landlord knows that the tenant is unable to pay the same due to financial impacts related to COVID-19
  - No-fault eviction unless immediately necessary for the health and safety of tenants, neighbors or the landlord, other than based on illness of the tenant or any other occupant of the residential rental
- Tenant must notify the landlord
  - Tenant must give notice of inability to pay rent within 7 days after the date rent is due.
  - Tenant must notify landlord in writing that tenant has incurred financial impacts as defined by the ordinance (See below)
  - Within 30 days after the date rent is due, tenant must provide written documentation to landlord to support the tenant's inability to pay all or part of the rent due.
- For purposes of this ordinance, "financial impacts" means -
  - Loss of the tenant's monthly household income due to business closure
  - Loss of compensable hours of work or wages
  - Extraordinary out-of-pocket medical expenses
- A financial impact is "related to COVID-19" if resulted from any of the following-
  - Tenant's own diagnosis with COVID-19 or the tenant's need to care for a household or immediate family member who is diagnosed with COVID-19
  - Layoff, loss of hours, or other income reduction resulting from business closure or other economic or employer impacts
  - Compliance with a recommendation or order from the County Health Officer to stay at home, isolate, self-quarantine, or avoid congregating with others during the COVID-19 state of emergency.
  - Extraordinary out-of-pocket expenses related to diagnosis and testing for treatment of COVID-19
  - Additional child care costs arising from school closures related to COVID-19
- During the period of local emergency, all residential tenants shall pay timely that portion of the rent the tenant is able to pay.
  - Nothing in this ordinance relieves tenants of any liability for unpaid rent which landlords may seek after expiration of the local emergency.
  - Tenants must pay all rent that is due within 6 months following the termination of this local emergency. All tenants are encouraged to work hand-in-hand with landlords.
- Finally, this ordinance prevents the enforcement of non-payment eviction notices, no-fault eviction notices, and unlawful detainer actions based on such notices and may be used as defense to any such action by a landlord in violation of this ordinance.

If a Monrovia tenant notifies their landlord of an inability to pay rent due to financial impacts of COVID-19, the landlord cannot serve an eviction notice, file or prosecute an unlawful detainer action based on a three-day pay or quit notice, or otherwise endeavor to evict the tenant for nonpayment of rent. Tenants may use the Monrovia moratorium as an affirmative defense in an unlawful detainer or other action brought by landlord to recover possession of the rental unit. The City will not engage as intermediary between landlords and tenants.

## COMMERCIAL RENTERS | COVID-19

## **INFORMATION & RESOURCES**

On Tuesday, April 7, the City Council approved an Urgency Ordinance which adopted emergency regulations to prohibit commercial evictions for non-payment of rent and "no-fault" evictions. The ordinance took effect immediately and will remain in place through the duration of the COVID-19 emergency declaration. This ordinance follows a similar ordinance prohibiting residential evictions which was approved on March 31. Now, both residential and commercial "non-payment of rent" and "no-fault" evictions are prohibited during the COVID-19 emergency.

- During the existence of the local emergency, no commercial property owner or agent shall take any action, or threaten, to evict a tenant in either of the following situations
  - Nonpayment of rent, late fees, or other fees or charges, if the landlord knows that the tenant is unable to pay the same due to financial impacts related to COVID-19
  - No-fault eviction unless immediately necessary for the health and safety of tenants, neighbors or the landlord, other than based on illness of the tenant or any other occupant of the tenant or any other occupant
- Tenant must notify the landlord
  - Tenant must give notice of inability to pay rent within 7 days after the date rent is due.
  - Tenant must notify landlord in writing that tenant has incurred financial impacts as defined by the ordinance
  - Within 30 days after the date rent is due, tenant must provide written documentation to landlord to support the tenant's inability to pay all or part of the rent due.
  - Also, it is important that tenant has applied for applicable state and federal aid programs and must supply to the landlord.
- For purposes of this ordinance, "financial impacts" means
  - Loss of the tenant's monthly business income due to business closure
  - Loss of compensable business, sales, or fees
  - Extraordinary out-of-pocket medical expenses
  - A financial impact is "related to COVID-19" if resulted from any of the following
  - A key employee or manager of the tenant's diagnosis with COVID-19 or that person's need to care for a household or immediate family member who is diagnosed with COVID-19
  - Loss of business, fees or business income resulting from the Safer at Home Order, a business closure, or other economic impacts of COVID-19
  - Compliance with a recommendation or order from the County Health Officer to close the business, stay at home, isolate, self-quarantine, or avoid congregating with others during the COVID-19 state of emergency.
  - Extraordinary out-of-pocket expenses related to diagnosis and testing for treatment of COVID-19
  - The business owner, manager or key employees' need to provide additional child care costs arising from school closures related to COVID-19
- During the period of local emergency, all tenants shall pay timely that portion of the rent the tenant is able to pay.
  - Nothing in this ordinance relieves tenants of any liability for unpaid rent which landlords may seek after expiration of the local emergency.
  - Tenants must pay all rent that is due within 6 months following the termination of this local emergency. All tenants are encouraged to work hand-in-hand with landlords.
- Finally, this ordinance prevents the enforcement of non-payment eviction notices, no-fault eviction notices, and unlawful detainer actions based on such notices and may be used as defense to any such action by a landlord in violation of this ordinance.
