TITLE: Canyon Park and Hillside Wilderness Preserve Patrol Update for March 2021

OBJECTIVE: To provide an update on incidents, maintenance, and public comments related to Canyon Park and the Hillside Wilderness Preserve (HWP) recorded for the month of March 2021.

BACKGROUND: For over a century, Canyon Park has been used as a recreational park by visitors and Monrovia residents. Services in Canyon Park include special events; Naturalist led night hikes, interpretive tours, a Nature Center, trails, a waterfall, and views of the San Gabriel Valley. In addition, Naturalists and volunteers maintain the trail systems and facilities.

In 2016, the City opened over 4.5 miles of HWP trials providing passive recreational opportunities for the community. Park Naturalists patrol the HWP and urban parks two times a day by vehicle, utility terrain vehicle and foot. Park Naturalists also respond to calls related to Monrovia's Smoking Ban Ordinance.

On September 12, the Bobcat Fire entered Monrovia Canyon Park, firefighters used a defensive approach to protect buildings and structures, including the Nature Center, Ranger Station, Cabin, and restrooms. The fire suppression tactics, which included controlled burns, burned a significant amount of brush in the park but all buildings remain intact with only smoke damage. Popular hiking trails are no longer accessible and debris from high above is already rolling down the hills and landing on park trails. In total, about 278 acres of Monrovia owned open space (including 80 acres of Monrovia Canyon Park) is damaged. With the need for ongoing damage assessments and emergency preventative measures needed, we anticipate the park will be closed for some time. During this time, to secure Monrovia Canyon Park, a secondary fence has been installed at the gate to further secure the park after hours. Additionally, signs are posted as the area remains very dangerous.

The post Bobcat Fire, Burn Area Emergency Response (BEAR) report from the US Forest Service Department shows potential rainfalls this winter and spring season creating heavy mud and debris flows in Canyon Park and HWP. A hydrology study of Canyon Park has been conducted by the City Engeinner outlining preventative measures such as clearing portion fo the streambed and placing k-rail in stratregic locactions to minimize damanage to property and loss of life. In addition, Staff has submitted an Emergency Streambed Alteration Notification with the Department of Fish and Wildlife. Staff is prepared to handle each incident on a case by case basis following each rain event including assessing any damage and conducting necessary clean up.

Due to minimal damage in HWP, the trail systems reopened on November 16 2020. Limited hiking opportunities in San Gabriel Valley such as Canyon Park, Sturdevent Falls, Hwy 39, and Eaton Canyon

has increased number of daily visitors to the HWP, primarily at the Ridgeside and Cloverleaf access points.

ANALYSIS: During the month of March 2021, Canyon Park Volunteers and Park Naturalists completed 116 hours of maintenance in Canyon Park. Maintenance included clearing debris on the trail, erosion control measures to stabilize the trail, and brush clearance around the facility picnic grounds.

Park Naturalists and Park Volunteers are also taking the time to address small maintenance projects within Canyon Park. Some of these projects include: repainting all wood picnic benches, repainting wood railings at the overpasses, power washing of all sidewalks and buildings, re-establishing and re-purposing the wooden kiosk display case near the Nature Center, and deep cleaning of the Nature Center exhibits. In addition, Staff will be working with Public Works to schedule deep cleaning for all the flooring with the Nature Center, Ranger Station, Cabin, and restrooms.

Canyon Park's Instagram page relaunched on March 8, showcasing the natural rehabilitation of the park post fire. Staff have created a thoughtful posting schedule that will include educational photos, interpretive videos, and craft videos. The photo and video posts will give followers an inside look at the recovery of the flora, fauna, and ecological systems until Canyon Park reopens.

On March 10, Staff worked closely with the Monrovia Fire Department to host and participate in a chain saw training course held in Canyon Park. This training course allowed our staff to become properly trained and certified to drop larger size trees creating a hazard within the park. A second course will be offered in May which will complete the training session.

Staff has been working on assessing the best way to repair the damaged trails in order to reopen Canyon Park. Staff contacted Bellfree Contractors Inc., the Contractor who completed the repairs within the HWP Fire Road and Trail System, to assess portions of the Bill Cull and the Waterfall trails which eroded away from rain following the Bobcat Fire. Staff has received the assessment, scope of work, and quote for the work to be complete. Staff will be working on presenting an Award of Contract at an upcoming City Council meeting.

RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends the Community Services Commission move to receive and file CC-2, Canyon Park and Hillside Wilderness Preserve Patrol Update for March 2021.
