

Background



- In 2018, City Council directed staff...
 - Study the possibility of establishing a Community Garden Program
 - Parks Master Plan process identified Community Gardens to be the third highest priority of survey respondents
 - Received requests for a Community Garden from engaged citizens
- Staff began the assessment on the feasibility of establishing a Community Garden Pilot Program – We learned we had a lot to learn!
 - Met with experts in the field to learn best practice
 - Conducted research on community garden models utilized by neighboring cities
 - Investigated possible locations that would adhere to the perimeters needed for a successful community garden

Background

- "Monrovia Magic"
 - Staff mentioned the Community Garden efforts with representatives from Mountainside Communion
 - Mountainside shared that they were hoping to develop a Community Garden on their property for the community's use
 - Staff continues these discussions related to a possible partnership with Mountainside to coordinate development of a pilot program
 - Partnership plans included private and public gardening space and management by experts in gardening from Mountainside

The most successful Community Garden were managed collaboratively between the city, a non-profit, and community volunteers!



Background

- November 6, 2018 = Community Garden Study Session
 - Staff presented the plan to collaborate with Mountainside to City Council
- Following that, the City entered into a 3-year agreement with Mountainside for the development, construction and management of the Monrovia Community Garden Pilot Program
 - The contract included \$30,000 for the build out of the garden
 - \$15,000 annual investment for the ongoing management and maintenance of the garden
 - Included 7 free community educational workshops a year



Our Goals

- Garden Dedication = Saturday, July 20, 2019
 - Develop a Pilot Program by which the project team could better assess what the community is looking for in a Community Garden
 - Develop physical environment to provide communal and private gardening
 - Develop workshops to assess community members level of interest on various garden topics
 - Create a wonderful space for residents to feel connected to the community



Impactful Stories



Victoria and Robert were part of our first cohort of gardeners. A few months into their new gardening journey, Robert had a heart attack. In August of 2019, he named their plot "Fresh Start" because he was on a new health journey. Sadly in October 2019, Robert passed away. Kristin ran into Victoria at the garden as she was harvesting all of the cucumbers he planted that August. "I want to have them in the water at his service," she told Kristin, "because this was our chance to start over." The city honored Robert, a long time Monrovian, at a council meeting. And Victoria has been gardening the "Fresh Start" bed ever since to honor Robert and to stay connected to her community.

Impactful Stories



Mr. Ali was one of our first plotholders. He and his caretaker, Chris, were heavily involved in the garden and our events. In his late 80s, the garden is what he looked forward to most during his week. The taller ADA accessible beds were greatly appreciated by Mr. Ali as his health issues made it virtually impossible to bend over or work lower to the ground. Mr. Ali passed away last year, but in his final year, the garden was said to be his favorite activity.

Lessons Learned



• COVID

- Program began 9 months prior to the shut down due to COVID
- COVID significantly impacted this study and certainly impacted our overall evaluation of the Pilot Program **But we still thrived!**
 - Garden remained open and was managed safely
 - Request for space has been difficult to measure due to COVID- Demand is teetering on needing more space – Expected this will escalate as we return to "normalcy"
 - Program overall still exceeded our expectations even in light of COVID

Lessons Learned

• Community Spirit

- Garden Leadership Team is essential!
- Garden fosters community spirit and connection to the community
- Group beds are challenging
- Inspiration for others to grow at home

• <u>Model Program</u>

- City is seen as a leader in LA County for innovative partnerships and programs
 - CPRS Award
 - SCAG Award



Lessons Learned

• Education

- High desire for education
 - High attendance at all Workshops and Pop Ups
 - Strong interest in communication and materials from the Garden Leadership Team
 - Far reaching due to Virtual Workshop Platform
 - More desire for in person hands on learning
 - Need for more resources.

Compost

- Compost station is in high demand and will continue to grow
 - SB 1383 Organics Recycling
- One of the most productive sites in LA County
- Working with City of Monrovia Clean Monrovia on collaborative efforts education and more compost stations

Water Conservation

- The Garden replaced an area that was previously turf
- The entire Garden is on an efficient drip system
- On rain days, the Garden Leadership team turn off the irrigation to conserve water



Our Accomplishments

 Successfully develop a Pilot Program but had some challenges assessing what the community is looking for in a Community Garden due to the pandemic. May need more assessment.



- Created a beautiful space for the community to gather and enjoy both communal and private gardens
- Exceeded our expectations on the desire and interest from the community related to educational workshops on various garden topics
- Created community for many residents who now feel a part of Monrovia

Community Services Commission Feedback

- On April 12, staff presented a similar presentation for the Community Services Commission
 - Overall pleased with the program and its accomplishments
 - Support for more educational workshops
 - Study possible future expansions of Compost Bins and Community Gardens
 - More promotion of the Community Garden may be needed



Options for your Consideration

Staff Recommends Option 1:

- Approve Amendment No. 1 to the Consultant Services
 Agreement with Mountainside Communion A Church of
 the Nazarene dated November 20, 2018, for the ongoing
 management of the Monrovia Community Garden
 Program for the Period Ending June 30, 2025, in an amount
 not to exceed \$24,000 annually, and authorize the City
 Manager to execute the necessary documents in a form
 approved by the City Attorney.
 - Additional \$9,000 will support Garden Maintenance and repairs, support a quarterly newsletter for the community, and include 2 educational social media posted per month.
