Waiting for a member of the public to report an individual in crisis introduces unnecessary delays and could potentially result in escalating situations or missed opportunities for early intervention.

I respectfully urge the Monrovia City Council to work in collaboration with the SGVCOG and L.A. CADA to review and amend the operating procedures of the SGV CARE Program. I propose

that the restrictions on preemptive intervention be lifted, allowing L.A. CADA to engage with individuals experiencing mental health issues, regardless of whether or not a call has been placed by a member of the public. This change would align the program's procedures more closely with its primary goal of providing timely and effective care to those in need.

Additionally, I encourage the council to consider allocating resources for increased public awareness campaigns and education initiatives. By educating our community about the signs of mental health crises and how to appropriately report them, we can empower individuals to play an active role in helping those in distress.

In conclusion, I believe that by revisiting and revising the current operating procedures of the SGV CARE Program, we can improve its effectiveness and maximize its positive impact on our community.
