## Recap of 12/19/23 Study Session

## Measure K Fund Balance

- Measure K contributes approximately \$6.9M per year in revenues to the City's cash balances.
- O To date, \$3.42M has been used for Measure K projects, leaving an estimated \$30.63M in Measure K reserves at the end of FY 2024-25.

## Next Steps – Appoint New Measure K Citizen Advisory Committee

- 5 members
  - Edward Corser
  - O Philip Tiffany
  - Brenda Trainor
  - Michael Vachani
  - Janet Wall (Michael Kaplan appointed to Janet Wall's seat on October 4, 2022)
- Each Council member nominated one person to serve 4 year term.
  - Appointed on January 7, 2020
  - O Terms expired on June 30, 2024
- Next Steps: Solicit interest and appoint/reappoint citizens to serve on the committee

# Next Steps – Develop a Draft Spending Plan?

- Since April 1, 2020, Council has authorized \$3,427,399
- At the end of the current fiscal year, the City anticipates there to be \$30,633,634 in unallocated Measure K Fund Balance
- Since February 2021, Council Direction was not to spend additional Measure K Funds
  - Spending Plan was "not to spend"
- O Does Council wish to proceed with a Spending Plan at this time?

## Where to start?

- Staff can prepare a draft spending plan at the direction of City Council
- Spending Plan would be reviewed by Measure K Citizen Advisory Committee for "review and comment"
- Staff would return and present the plan to City Council for consideration

#### Measure K Financial Policy

Adopted by City Council February 7, 2023

This financial policy provides direction to City Staff to consider when developing a proposed Annual Spending Plan for Measure K funds that shall be regularly presented to the Measure K Citzens Advisory Committee for review and comment. There is no particular hierarchy to these six policies as presented, rather, any or all of these quiding policies may be considered when evaluating spending proposals for Measure K Funds.

POLICY I PRIORITIZE BASIC NEEDS OVER NEW PROJECTS

The City shall prioritize maintaining the city's basic needs, including maintaining existing infrastructure and operations, before committing funding towards new projects with new ongoing costs.

POLICY II COMPLETE ONE-TIME PROJECTS

The City Council, City partners and Monrovia community have many ideas and interests in one-time projects that cannot move forward due to the lack of available, flexible funding. Funding would be made available for one-time projects that remain unfunded and provide a public benefit

POLICY III WHEN POSSIBLE, LEVERAGE N

WHEN POSSIBLE, LEVERAGE MEASURE K FUNDS TO SEEK OTHER FUNDING SOURCES

### Ideas for Council Consideration....

The Projects below are current unfunded or underfunded – Total \$13.1m

- Satoru Tsuneishi Park \$1.5m
- Public Library Enhancement Project \$6m
- Staff is working thru Canyon Park Repair Project
  - estimate >75% is likely paid by third party (insurance, FEMA, CalOES or grants)
- What if the Council allocates a portion of Measure K to address misc items on the Measure K Community Survey?
  - Staff could prepare a budget and plan and address a variety of small items
