

OUTDOOR ENTERTAINMENT PERMIT

Outdoor Entertainment shall mean cultural, entertainment, athletic, and other events for spectators outside of the building, either on public or private property. The provision of outdoor entertainment is considered incidental to the primary use and is provided on an intermittent basis. Outdoor Entertainment Permits are granted either on a regular, on-going or temporary basis.

Temporary Outdoor Entertainment. The Development Review Committee (DRC) reviews all requests for Temporary Outdoor Entertainment Permits.

- Temporary Outdoor Entertainment is allowed for a maximum of 30 consecutive days in a twelve-month period.
- The applicant shall be required to give written notification to all businesses that are located on both sides of the street on the same block of the subject property of the intent to have outdoor entertainment. Proof of such notification shall be provided to the City at the time of review by the Development Review Committee.

Regular (On-going) Outdoor Entertainment. The Planning Commission reviews requests for Conditional Use Permits for Outdoor Entertainment that exceeds the maximum 30 consecutive days in a twelve-month period that are allowed for a Temporary Outdoor Entertainment.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

Minimum Clearance. A minimum unobstructed pedestrian clearance of at least forty-eight inches (48") in width shall be maintained along the entire length of the sidewalk. Additional clearance may be required based on the location of existing sidewalk obstructions and pedestrian traffic volumes.

Indemnification Statement. An agreement satisfactory to the City Attorney shall be submitted to the City whereby the applicant agrees to indemnify, defend and hold the City and its officers, employees and agents harmless from any claims and damages that occur as a result of the entertainment.

Liability Insurance. Insurance in the amount determined by the City's Risk Manager shall be required naming the City as an additional insured.

Neighboring Business Approval. If not part of an existing business, the proposed entertainment must be sponsored by the adjacent business.
